This 2018 school year is racing away and soon we will be at the mid-point of the calendar and looking towards the festive season. Where do the days go?

Next Monday 11th June is a public holiday and children are not required at school. We are also moving closer to the end of Term 2 on Friday 29th June

Resilience Project

This year the school is participating in 'The Resilience Project' in partnership with Martin Heppell our facilitator. I think it is timely now to review where we are at with the project. Feedback from all sessions has been incredibly positive and we thank all teachers, the wellbeing team and our students for taking this on board. What we have accomplished so far:

- Martin engaged STAFF at a professional development session and provided them with resources, activities and knowledge to support their work with students
- He inspired STUDENTS across all year levels through the delivery of two highly engaging presentations
- He then empowered PARENTS and delivered a presentation that provided practical strategies to help build their son/daughters resilience.
- SNPS will also receive regular newsletters with interesting and supportive approaches to teaching resilience in the school setting
- The children are all utilising the Resilience Project Student Journal and teaching resources

In Addition, as a Partnership school we will receive the following benefits:

- All students from Years 3 to 6 completed The Resilient Youth Survey, which is a scientifically validated student wellbeing survey completed by over 200,000 students across Australia. This data informs the content of our presentations.
- A Resilience Profile Workshop for staff which focuses on the school's survey data and how it relates to The Resilience Project curriculum
- Teachers are given the accompanying Teacher Resource and access to additional resources via The Resilience Project resource hub.
- The school also receives ongoing support throughout the year from our School Programs Manger in regard to program delivery and evaluation
- Our school will also receive additional lessons and curriculum support on current world events that explore resilience and mental health

Student Learning and Effort

When we talk about student achievement, we talk about what the teacher does that is most effective and also what students can do that increases their learning. Things like maintaining effort, concentrating, giving attention to, focusing, persevering and completing the work or task. Seaford North PS students and teachers use learning goals and intentions for each lesson to help students know what to do and what to focus on. Focus is about making things clearer, doing those things like identifying similarities and differences that make learning explicit and building connections to other things students know or know how to do.

Students in class can do many things to help improve their learning like making notes while the teacher is talking, draw an image to represent what they have learned, asking the teacher for help or feedback. These things keep our students on track, paying attention and focused. Through their planning, our teachers help students to improve motivation and risk taking. Through their use of prompts, visual images, short video clips, humour, making things engaging and fun, making it challenging, making the learning interesting, students will be more focused. This means students will do more, write more, read more, be connected more, be able to apply more, be involved more in class, be learning more. As a staff we are aiming for at least 12 months' learning progress in a calendar year for all of our children.

Department of Education & Training Update

Same-day notification of unexplained student absences

Protecting the safety and wellbeing of children through reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and schools.

Parents and carers have an obligation to notify the school of their child's absence as soon as possible on the day of absence using the school's preferred method, including use of an online IT or app, by telephone or by email.

New School Attendance Guidelines

From the end of Term 2 2018, all Victorian government schools must contact parents/carers as soon as practicable on the same-day of an unexplained student absence.

The same-day notification requirement supports the safety and wellbeing of all students. Schools need to know when and why a child is absent and parents/carers need to know if their child is not at school. Prompt communication also promotes daily school attendance. Going to school every day is the single most important part of a child's education. Children and young people who regularly attend school and complete Year 12 or an equivalent qualification have better health outcomes, better employment outcomes, and higher incomes across their lives.

The Department of Education and Training is supporting schools to meet this new requirement using available online solutions where practicable and ensuring parents and carers are aware of their responsibility to notify schools of a child's absence.

Schools and parents working together to support student attendance

Building positive and collaborative relationships through clear communications with parents and carers is critical to the successful implementation of the same-day notification requirement.

The responsibility needs to be underpinned by shared understandings and expectations about the procedures for monitoring, recording and follow-up of student attendance as outlined in the school's Attendance Policy. Distributing the school's Attendance Policy to parents and carers will help ensure they are aware of their obligation to notify the school of their child's absence and minimise the follow-up required by schools.

What is the school's responsibility?

- **Notify parents/carers:** The school must notify parents and carers as soon as practicable on the same day of an unexplained absence. This should occur in the morning allowing time for the parent or carer to respond. Schools can choose how they advise parent and carers based on their local context e.g. by email, push notification via downloaded app, SMS or phone call.
- **Follow-up (where required):** At times the parent or carer may not be able to be reached because the school does not have their correct contact details (i.e. changed phone number, SMS/email failure notification received etc.). In this instance, the school should attempt to make contact with any emergency contact/s nominated on the child's file held by the school, where possible, on the same day of the unexplained absence.
- **Record student absences data:** Under the School Attendance Guidelines, schools are required to record or transpose absence data in CASES21, eCASES or a third party software which is compatible with CASES21. Schools using third party software are required to import attendance data into CASES21.

Parent/carer's responsibility

Parents/carers are required to ensure their child attends school every day and have an obligation to contact the school to notify the school of their child's absence. Parents/carers should inform the school in advance of known upcoming absences, or on the day of absence as soon as practicable. In addition, in order to implement this requirement, it is essential that parent/carers provide schools with their most up-to-date contact details.

Safety Message!!!

A Deadly Nightshade Weed or a Black (blackberry) Nightshade weed found on school fence near wetlands walkway.

Unfortunately a bush was found along the school fence line. The bush has been removed and the school perimeter checked. Please reinforce with all your children not to eat <u>any</u> berries found outside. Nightshade plants particularly Black Nightshade are in the wetlands and are **poisonous!**

Nightshade has many members, all having toxic properties but it's the weedy, creeping varieties that are most likely to cause issues in the landscape.

Black Nightshade A bushy or herbaceous plant growing up to 1.25 m tall. Its stems are rough in texture and its leaves are slightly hairy or hairless. Its small star-shaped flowers are white (often tinged with purple) and borne in small clusters in the leaf forks. Its fruit are dull green when young, turning purplish-black and remaining dull in nature as they mature.

Belladonna nightshade (*Atropa belladonna*), also known as deadly nightshade is often seen in gardens and bushland. This perennial has reddish-purple to greenish-purple flowers and purple-black berries.



The new Child Care Subsidy and what it means for you

On the 2nd of July, the Australian Government will transition to a new Child Care Subsidy (CCS). This will replace the existing Child Care Rebate (CCR) and Child Care Benefit (CCB).

There are a number of key changes that families who rely on childcare before and/or after school need to know, including:

- Any benefit will be paid directly to child care providers (like Camp Australia), who will then only bill the 'gap' amount to families.
- There will continue to be hardship relief.
- For families earning less than \$186,958, there will no longer be an annual cap on the amount of subsidy you can receive. For families earning between \$186,958 and \$351,248, an increased annual subsidy cap of \$10,000 per child will apply each year.

Musically is a social network for sharing usergenerated music videos. You can upload your own videos, remix others' work, or browse content created by other users and by famous recording artists. Because it involves popular music, there's lots of swearing and adult content in the songs. Some families have encountered explicit adult material despite the available settings and controls in the app. Parents should make sure to turn on all privacy settings for accounts kids are using.

Snapchat

Snapchat is a popular messaging app that allows users to exchange their photos, texts, videos, and calls - both audio and video. The developer claims that "Snaps" can't be saved within the app and are only viewable for one to 10 seconds before disappearing from the recipient's device. While the app notifies the sender if the recipient takes a screenshot of an image, it does not prevent it from happening or what it may then be used for.

Instagram

Instagram is a popular platform for instantly enhancing photos and videos with cool effects and sharing them across a number of social media platforms. Users can flag photos for review, but mature content still appears in some photos and in the comment sections. Photos shared in Instagram are public and may have location information unless privacy settings are adjusted.
